CHAPTER 24

MOTOR VEHICLE CODE

ARTICLE I - DEFINITIONS

24-1-1 <u>ILLINOIS VEHICLE CODE</u>; <u>DEFINITIONS ADOPTED</u>. The Illinois Vehicle Code, <u>Illinois Compiled Statutes</u>, <u>Chapter 625</u>, <u>Chapter 1</u>, entitled <u>"Title and Definitions"</u>, as passed, approved and amended by the Illinois General Assembly is hereby adopted by the Village, the provisions thereof shall be controlling within the corporate limits of the Village. (65 ILCS 5/1-3-2 and 5/11-1-1)

ARTICLE II - GENERAL REGULATIONS

- **24-2-1 OBEDIENCE TO POLICE.** Members of the Police Department, Special Police, Auxiliary Police and Marshals assigned to traffic duty are hereby authorized to direct all traffic in accordance with the provisions of this Article or in emergencies as public safety or convenience may require, and it shall be unlawful for any person to fail or refuse to comply with any lawful order, signal or direction of a policeman. Except in cases of emergency, it shall be unlawful for any person not authorized by law to direct or attempt to direct traffic. **(625 ILCS 5/11-203)**
- **24-2-2 SCENE OF FIRE.** The Fire Department officer in command or any fireman designated by him may exercise the powers and authority of a policeman in directing traffic at the scene of any fire or where the Fire Department has responded to an emergency call for so long as the Fire Department equipment is on the scene in the absence of or in assisting the Police Department.
- **24-2-3 SIGNS AND SIGNALS.** It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle to disobey the instructions of any traffic sign or signal placed in view by authority of the corporate authorities or in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois except upon direction of a police officer. All signs and signals established by direction of the governing body shall conform to the Illinois State Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways. **(625 ILCS 5/11-301)**
- **24-2-4 UNAUTHORIZED SIGNS.** No person shall place, maintain or display upon or in view of any street, any unauthorized sign, signal, marking, light, reflector or device which purports to be or is an imitation of or resembles an official traffic-control device or railroad sign or signal, or which attempts to direct the movement of traffic, nor shall any person place, maintain or display upon or in view of any street, any other sign which hides from view or interferes with the movement of traffic or effectiveness of any traffic-control device or any railroad sign or signal, and no person shall place or maintain, nor shall any public authority permit upon any highway, any traffic sign or signal bearing thereon any commercial advertising. No tree, bush or foliage of any kind shall be so placed, maintained, allowed to remain, or be displayed upon either public or private property in such a manner as to hide from view or interfere with the movement of traffic or the effectiveness of any traffic-control device, sign or signal.

- **24-2-5 INTERFERENCE WITH SIGNS OR SIGNALS.** It shall be unlawful for any person to deface, injure, move or interfere with any official traffic sign or signal.
- 24-2-6 ADVERTISING SIGNS. It shall be unlawful to maintain anywhere in the Village any sign, signal, marking or device other than a traffic sign or signal authorized by the Village Board or the Illinois State Department of Public Works and Buildings, which purports to be or is an imitation of or resembles an official traffic-control device or railroad sign or signal in view of any street or highway, and it shall be unlawful to place or maintain any sign which hides from view any lawful traffic-control device. It shall be unlawful to maintain or operate any flashing or rotating beacon of light in view of any street or highway. (See Chapter 27 and 33) (Also See Chapter 40 Zoning Code)
- **24-2-7 ANIMALS OR BICYCLES.** Any person riding a bicycle or an animal or driving any animal drawing a vehicle upon any street shall be subject to the provisions of this Code applicable to the driver of a vehicle, except those provisions which can have no application to one riding a bicycle or driving or riding an animal. **(625 ILCS 5/11-206)**

24-2-8 LAMPS AND OTHER EQUIPMENT ON BICYCLES.

- (A) Every bicycle, when in use at nighttime, shall be equipped with a lamp on the front which shall emit a white light visible from a distance of at least **five hundred (500) feet** to the front and with a red reflector on the rear of a type approved by the Department which shall be visible from all distances of **one hundred (100) feet** to **six hundred (600) feet** to the rear when directly in front of lawful lower beams of headlights on a motor vehicle. A lamp emitting a red light visible from a distance of **five hundred (500) feet** to the rear may be used in addition to the red reflector.
- (B) A bicycle shall not be equipped with, nor shall any person use any siren upon a bicycle.
- (C) Every bicycle shall be equipped with a brake which will adequately control movement of and stop and hold such bicycle.
- (D) No person shall sell a new bicycle or pedal for use on a bicycle that is not equipped with a reflex reflector or conforming to specifications prescribed by the State on each pedal, visible from the front and rear of the bicycle during darkness from a distance of **two hundred (200)** feet.
- (E) No person shall sell or offer for sale a new bicycle that is not equipped with side reflectors. Such reflectors shall be visible from each side of the bicycle from a distance of **five hundred** (500) feet and shall be essentially colorless or red to the rear of the center of the bicycle and essentially colorless or amber to the front of the center of the bicycle provided. The requirements of this paragraph may be met by reflective materials which shall be at least **three-sixteenths of an inch (3/16th")** wide on each side of each tire or rim to indicate as clearly as possible the continuous circular shape and size of the tires or rims of such bicycle and which reflective materials may be of the same color on both the front and rear tire or rim. Such reflectors shall conform to specifications prescribed by the State.
- (F) No person shall sell or offer for sale a new bicycle that is not equipped with an essentially colorless front-facing reflector.
- (G) Any person charged with a violation of this section shall pay a fine of **One Dollar** (\$1.00) for the first offense and for a similar charge during the same year a fine of **Five Dollars** (\$5.00). (625 ILCS 5/11-1507)

ARTICLE III - STOP AND THROUGH STREETS

- 24-3-1 THROUGH STREETS. The streets and parts of streets of the Village designated by ordinance as "through streets" are hereby declared to be through streets. The driver of a vehicle shall stop at the entrance to a through street and shall yield the right-of-way to other vehicles which have entered the intersection or which are approaching so close on a through street as to constitute an immediate hazard unless directed otherwise by the traffic officer. See Schedule "A" for applicable through and stop streets.
- **24-3-2 ONE-WAY STREETS OR ALLEYS.** It shall be unlawful to operate any vehicle on any streets or alleys designated as one-way streets or alleys by ordinance in any direction other than that so designated. See **Schedule** "B" for the designated one-way streets and alleys. **(625 ILCS 5/11-208)**
- 24-3-3 <u>STOP STREETS.</u> The driver of a vehicle shall stop in obedience to a stop sign at an intersection where a stop sign is erected pursuant to ordinance at one or more entrances thereto and shall proceed cautiously, yielding to the vehicles not so obliged to stop which are within the intersection or approaching so close as to constitute an immediate hazard, unless traffic at such intersection is controlled by a police officer on duty, in which event, the directions of the police officer shall be complied with. See **Schedule "A"** for designated stop intersections. **(625 ILCS 5/11-302)**

Any person receiving a citation under this Article shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Ordinance and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law. **(Ord. No. 18-595; 07-11-18)**

24-3-4 <u>YIELD RIGHT-OF-WAY STREETS.</u> The driver of a vehicle approaching a yield sign, in obedience to such sign, shall slow down to a speed reasonable for the existing conditions and if required for safety to stop, shall stop at a clearly marked stop line, but if none, before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection or if none, then at the point nearest the intersecting roadway where the driver has a view of approaching traffic on the intersecting roadway. After slowing or stopping, the driver shall yield the right-of-way to any vehicle in the intersection or approaching on another roadway so closely as to constitute an immediate hazard during the time such driver is moving across or within the intersection. (See Schedule "C")

Any person receiving a citation under this Article shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Ordinance and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law. **(Ord. No. 18-595; 07-11-18)**

24-3-5 POSTING SIGNS. Appropriate signs shall be posted to show all through, stop and yield right-of-way streets, all one-way streets and alleys and all stop intersections. (625 ILCS 5/11-304)

ARTICLE IV - DRIVING RULES

DIVISION I - GENERALLY

- **24-4-1** ILLINOIS VEHICLE CODE; RULES OF THE ROAD ADOPTED. The Illinois Vehicle Code, Illinois Compiled Statutes, Chapter 625, Section 11, entitled "Rules of the Road", as passed, approved and amended by the Illinois General Assembly is hereby adopted by the Village and the provisions thereof shall be controlling within the corporate limits of the Village except for the following changes, deletions and omissions:
 - (A) Omissions:
 - (1) Omit Sections 11-207, 11-208.1, 11-208.2, 11-209.1, 11-302, 11-303, 11-310(f), 11-313, 11-401 to and including 11-416, 11-500 to and including 11-502, 11-602, 11-603, 11-604, 11-606(b), 11-608, 11-1419, and 11-1422.
 - (B) <u>Changes and Additions:</u>
 - (1) Change 11-904(a) to read: "Preferential right-of-way at an intersection may be indicated by stop or yield signs as authorized by this Code."
 - (2) Change 11-1416(a) to read: "Any person who shall willfully and unnecessarily attempt to delay, hinder or obstruct any other person in lawfully driving and traveling upon or along any highway within this State or who shall offer for barter or sale, merchandise on said highway so as to interfere with the effective movement of traffic shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a violation of this Code."
 - 24-4-2 DRIVING RULES.
- (A) <u>Careless Driving.</u> It shall be unlawful to operate a vehicle in the Village in a careless manner so as to interfere with the safe or lawful operation of any other vehicle or so as to interfere with or to injure, damage, or endanger persons or property engaged in the lawful use of the street.
- (B) <u>Drag Racing Unlawful.</u> No person shall be a participant in drag racing as defined in **Section 5/11-504 of the Illinois Compiled Statutes.**
- (C) Fleeing or Attempting to Elude Police Officer. Any driver or operator of a motor vehicle who, having been given a visual or audible signal by a police officer directing such driver or operator to bring his vehicle to a stop, willfully fails to or refuses to obey such direction, increases his speed, extinguishes his lights or otherwise flees or attempts to elude the officer is guilty of a violation of this Chapter. The signal given by the police officer may be by hand, voice, siren, red or blue light. Provided, however, the officer giving such signal shall be in police uniform and if driving a vehicle, such vehicle shall be marked showing it to be an official police vehicle.
- (D) <u>Unlawful Possession of Highway Sign or Marker.</u> The Department of Local Authorities with reference to traffic-control signals, signs or markers owned by the Department of Local Authorities are authorized to indicate the ownership of such signs, signals or markers on the back of such devices in letters not less than **three-eighths of an inch (3/8")** or more than **three-fourths of an inch (3/4")** in height, by use of a metal stamp, etching or other permanent means and except for employees of the Department of Local Authorities, police officers, contractors and their employees engaged in highway construction, contract or work on the highway approved by the Department of Local Authorities, it is a violation of this Chapter for any person to possess such sign, signal or marker so identified. **(625 ILCS 5/11-313)**
- (E) Special Speed Limitations on Elevated Structures. No person shall drive a vehicle over any bridge or other elevated structure constituting a part of a highway at a speed which is greater than the maximum speed which can be maintained with safety to such bridge or structure when such structure is sign-posted.

Upon the trial of any person charged with the violation of this section, proof of the determination of the maximum speed by the Village and the existence of such signs is conclusive evidence of the maximum speed which can be maintained with safety to such bridge or structure. (625 ILCS 5/11-608)

(F) <u>General Speed Restrictions.</u> The speed limits on the various streets shall be approved by the Village Board, but shall not exceed **twenty miles per hour (20 MPH)** in a school zone and not to exceed **twenty-five miles per hour (25 MPH)** on a residential street; otherwise, **thirty miles per hour (30 MPH)** on an arterial street unless otherwise posted. (See Schedule "D") (625 ILCS 5/11-604) (65 ILCS 5/11-40-1)

The state traffic laws regulating the speed of vehicles shall be applicable upon all streets within the Village, except on West and East Main St. where it is deemed state property. All Village streets are applicable in regards to speeding violations in accordance to this Code. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive or operate a vehicle at a speed in excess of any speed so declared by posted signage that are in place giving notice. No person shall operate a vehicle on any of the streets within the Village at a greater speed than that specified by signage.

Any person receiving a citation under this Article shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Ordinance and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law. **(Ord. No. 18-595; 07-11-18)**

(G) <u>Special Speed Limit While Passing Schools.</u> No person shall drive a motor vehicle at a speed in excess of **twenty miles per hour (20 MPH)** while passing a school zone or while traveling upon any public thoroughfare on or across which children pass going to and from school during school days when school children are present.

This section shall not be applicable unless appropriate signs are posted upon streets and maintained by the Village or State wherein the school zone is located. (625 ILCS 5/11-605)

- (H) Failure to Reduce Speed. A vehicle shall be driven upon the streets and alleys of this Village at a speed which is reasonable and proper with regard to traffic conditions and the use of the street or alley. The fact that the vehicle does not exceed the applicable maximum speed limit does not relieve the driver of the duty to decrease speed when approaching and crossing an intersection or when special hazard exists with respect to pedestrian or other traffic or by reason of weather or highway conditions. Speed must be decreased as may be necessary to avoid colliding with any person or vehicle on or entering the highway in compliance with legal requirements and the duty of all persons to use due care.
- (I) <u>Traffic Lane Usage.</u> Whenever any roadway within the Village has been divided into **two (2)** or more clearly marked lanes for traffic, a vehicle shall be driven as nearly as practicable entirely within a single lane and shall not be moved from such lane until the driver has first ascertained that such movement can be made with safety.
- (J) <u>U-Turns Prohibited.</u> No driver of a vehicle shall make a "U-turn" on any street or at any intersection of any streets in the Village.
- 24-4-3 <u>DUTY TO REPORT ACCIDENT.</u> The driver of a vehicle which is in any manner involved in an accident within the Village shall, without unnecessary delay, notify the Police Department and shall make a report of such action. Failure to report an accident within the Village within **twenty-four (24) hours** shall result in arrests of the person or persons involved. **(625 ILCS 5/11-415)**
- **24-4-4** TRANSPORTING LIQUOR IN VEHICLES. No person shall transport, carry, possess or have any alcoholic liquor within the passenger area of any motor vehicle in this Village except in the original container and with the seal unbroken. **(625 ILCS 5/11-502)**

- 24-4-5 <u>EXCESSIVE NOISE STOPPED VEHICLE.</u> No operator of a motor vehicle shall, when the motor vehicle is stopped, unreasonably accelerate the engine thereof with the gears of the vehicle in neutral, thereby causing an unreasonably loud or excessive noise.
- **24-4-6 EXCESSIVE NOISE WHEELS.** No operator of a motor vehicle shall when the motor vehicle is stopped, accelerate the engine with the gears of such vehicle in neutral and while so accelerating the engine, shift the gears of the vehicle into a forward or reverse movement, thereby causing an unreasonably loud noise with the drive wheels of the vehicle.
- **24-4-7 RECKLESS, NEGLIGENT OR CARELESS DRIVING.** It shall be unlawful to operate any vehicle in the Village in a careless, reckless, negligent or wanton manner, or carelessly so as to endanger life or property.
- **24-4-8 EXCESSIVE NOISE WHILE DRIVING.** No operator of a motor vehicle shall, when operating the vehicle, accelerate the vehicle or rapidly stop the vehicle causing an unreasonably loud noise.

24-4-9 **RESERVED.**

DIVISION II - SPECIFIC REGULATIONS

- **24-4-10 SQUEALING OR SCREECHING.** No person shall operate any motor vehicle in such a manner as to cause or allow to be emitted squealing, screeching or other such noises from the vehicle's tires due to rapid acceleration or excessive speed around corners or other such reason. This Section shall not apply to the following conditions:
- (A) an authorized vehicle, when responding to an emergency call or when in the pursuit of an actual or a suspected violator; nor
- (B) the emergency operation of a motor vehicle when avoiding imminent danger; nor any raceway, racing facility or other public event, nor part of a highway, sanctioned by the appropriate governmental authority. Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this Article shall be fined **One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120.00)** for said violation.

Any person receiving a citation under this Article shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Section and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law.

24-4-11 MOTOR VEHICLE LIGHTING.

(A) Every motorcycle shall at all times exhibit at least **one (1)** lighted lamp, showing a white light visible for at least **five hundred (500) feet** in the direction the motorcycle is proceeding. However, in lieu of such lighted lamp, a motorcycle may be equipped with and use a means of modulating the upper beam of the head lamp between high and a lower brightness. No such head lamp

shall be modulated, except as authorized by state law, during times when lighted lamps are required for other motor vehicles.

- (B) All other motor vehicles shall exhibit at least **two (2)** lighted head lamps, with at least one on each side of the front of the vehicle, which satisfy United States Department of Transportation requirements, showing white lights, including that emitted by high intensity discharge (HID) lamps, or lights of a yellow or amber tint, during the period from sunset to sunrise, at times when rain, snow, fog, or other atmospheric conditions require the use of windshield wipers, and at any other times when, due to insufficient light or unfavorable atmospheric conditions, persons and vehicles on the roadway or street are not clearly discernible at a distance of **one thousand (1,000) feet**. Parking lamps may be used in addition to but not in lieu of such head lamps. Every motor vehicle, trailer, or semi-trailer shall also exhibit at least **two (2)** lighted lamps, commonly known as tail lamps (or brake lights), which shall be mounted on the left rear and right rear of the vehicle so as to throw a red light visible for at least **five hundred (500) feet** in the reverse direction, except that a truck tractor or road tractor manufactured before **January 1, 1968**, and all motorcycles need be equipped with only one such tail lamp.
- (C) Either a tail lamp or a separate lamp shall be so constructed and placed as to illuminate with a white light a rear registration plate when required and render it clearly legible from a distance of **fifty (50) feet** to the rear. Any tail lamp or tail lamps, together with any separate lamp or lamps for illuminating a rear registration plate, shall be so wired as to be lighted whenever the head lamps or auxiliary driving lamps are lighted.
- (D) A person shall install only head lamps that satisfy United Stated Department of Transportation regulations and show white light, including that emitted by HID lamps, or light of a yellow or amber tint for use by a motor vehicle.
- (E) Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this Section shall be fined One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120.00) for said violation. Any person receiving a citation under this Section shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within fourteen (14) days from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that fourteen (14) day period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Section and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law. (Ord. No. 18-594; 07-11-18)

24-4-12 FAILURE TO DIM HEADLIGHTS.

- (A) Whenever the driver of any vehicle equipped with an electric driving head lamp, driving head lamps, auxiliary driving lamp or auxiliary driving lamps is within **five hundred (500) feet** of another vehicle approaching from the opposite direction, the driver shall dim or drop such head lamp or head lamps and shall extinguish all auxiliary driving lamps.
- (B) The driver of any vehicle equipped with an electric driving head lamp, head lamps, auxiliary driving lamp or auxiliary driving lamps shall dim or drop such head lamp or head lamps and shall extinguish all auxiliary driving lamps when there is another vehicle traveling in the same direction less than **three hundred (300) feet** to the front of him.
- (C) No vehicle shall have the lighting system modified to allow more than **two (2)** electric head lamps to be lighted while operating in the dimmed or dropped position.
- (D) Nothing in this Section shall prohibit the use of auxiliary driving lamps, commonly referred to as "fog" lamps, when used in conjunction with head lamps, if such auxiliary driving lamps are adjusted and so aimed that the glaring rays are not projected into the eyes of drivers of oncoming vehicles.
- (E) Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this Section shall be fined **One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120.00)** for said violation.
- (F) Any person receiving a citation under this Section shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of

the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Section and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law. **(Ord. No. 18-594; 07-11-18)**

24-4-13 IMPROPER LANE USAGE. Whenever any roadway has been divided into **two** (2) or more clearly marked lanes for traffic the following rules in addition to all others consistent herewith shall apply.

(A) A vehicle shall be driven as nearly as practicable entirely within a single lane and shall not be moved from such lane until the driver has first ascertained that such movement can be made

with safety.

- (B) Upon a roadway which is divided into **three (3)** lanes and provides for two-way movement of traffic, a vehicle shall not be driven in the center lane except when overtaking and passing another vehicle traveling in the same direction when such center lane is clear of traffic within a safe distance, or in preparation for making a left turn or where such center lane is at the time allocated exclusively to traffic moving in the same direction that the vehicle is proceeding and such allocation is designated by official traffic control devices.
- (C) Official traffic control devices may be erected directing specific traffic to use a designated lane or designating those lanes to be used by traffic moving in a particular direction regardless of the center of the roadway and drivers of vehicles shall obey the directions of every such device. On multi-lane controlled access highways with **three (3)** or more lanes in one direction or on any multi-lane highway with **two (2)** or more lanes in one direction, lanes of traffic may be designated to be used by different types of motor vehicles. Drivers must obey lane designation signing except when it is necessary to use a different lane to make a turning maneuver.

(D) Official traffic control devices may be installed prohibiting the changing of lanes

on sections of roadway and drivers of vehicles shall obey the directions of every such device.

(E) Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this Section shall be fined

One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120.00) for said violation.

(F) Any person receiving a citation under this Section shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Section and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law.

24-4-14 FAILURE TO SIGNAL/IMPROPER SIGNAL.

- (A) No person may turn a vehicle at an intersection unless the vehicle is in proper position upon the roadway or turn a vehicle to enter a private road or driveway, or otherwise turn a vehicle from a direct course or move right or left upon a roadway unless and until such movement can be made with reasonable safety. No person may so turn any vehicle without giving an appropriate signal in the manner hereinafter provided.
- (B) A signal of intention to turn right or left when required must be given continuously during not less than the last **one hundred (100) feet** traveled by the vehicle before turning within a business or residence district, and such signal must be given continuously during not less than the last **two hundred (200) feet** traveled by the vehicle before turning outside a business or residence district.

- (C) No person may stop or suddenly decrease the speed of a vehicle without first giving an appropriate signal to the driver of any vehicle immediately to the rear when there is opportunity to give such a signal.
- (D) An electric turn signal device must be used to indicate an intention to turn, change lanes or start from a parallel parked position but must not be flashed on one side only on a parked or disabled vehicle or flashed as a courtesy or "do pass" signal to operators of other vehicles approaching from the rear. However, such signal devices may be flashed simultaneously on both sides of a motor vehicle to indicate the presence of a vehicular traffic hazard requiring unusual care in approaching, overtaking and passing.
- (E) Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this Section shall be fined **One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120.00)** for said violation.
- (F) Any person receiving a citation under this Section shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Section and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law.

24-4-15 LOUD MUFFLER/VEHICLE EXCESSIVE NOISE. Every motor vehicle driven or operated shall at all times be equipped with an adequate muffler or exhaust system in constant operation and properly maintained to prevent any excessive or unusual noise. No such muffler or exhaust system shall be equipped with a cutout, bypass or similar device. No person shall modify the exhaust system of a motor vehicle in a manner which will amplify or increase the noise of such vehicle above that emitted by the muffler originally installed on the vehicle, and such original muffler shall comply with all the requirements of this Section. Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this Section shall be fined One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120.00) for said violation. Any person receiving a citation under this Section shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within fourteen (14) days from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that fourteen (14) day period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Section and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law. (Ord. No. 18-594; 07-11-18)

24-4-16 ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION DEVICES.

- (A) As used in this Section, "electronic communication device" means an electronic device, including but not limited to a hand-held wireless telephone, hand-held personal digital assistant, or a portable or mobile computer, but does not include a global positioning system or navigation system or a device that is physically or electronically integrated into the motor vehicle.
- (B) A person may not operate a motor vehicle on a roadway while using an electronic communication device.
 - (C) This Section does not apply to:
 - (1) A law enforcement officer or operator of an emergency vehicle while performing his or her official duties;
 - (2) A driver using an electronic communication device for the sole purpose of reporting an emergency situation and continued communication with emergency personnel during the emergency situation;

- (3) A driver using an electronic communication device in hands-free or voiceoperated mode, which may include the use of a headset;
- (4) A driver of a commercial motor vehicle reading a message displayed on a permanently installed communication device designed for a commercial motor vehicle with a screen that does not exceed **ten (10) inches** tall by **ten (10) inches** wide in size;
- (5) A driver using an electronic communication device while parked on the shoulder of a roadway;
- (6) A driver using an electronic communication device when the vehicle is stopped due to normal traffic being obstructed and the driver has the motor vehicle transmission in neutral or park;
- (7) A driver using two-way or citizens band radio services;
- (8) A driver using two-way mobile radio transmitters or receivers for licensees of the Federal Communication Commission in the amateur radio service;
- (9) A driver using an electronic communication device by pressing a single button to initiate or terminate a voice communication; or
- (10) A driver using an electronic communication device capable of performing multiple functions, other than a hand-held wireless telephone or hand-held personal digital assistant (for example, a fleet management system, dispatching device, citizens band radio, or music player) for a purpose that is not otherwise prohibited by this Section.
- (D) Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this Section shall be fined **One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120.00)** for said violation.
- (E) Any person receiving a citation under this Section shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Section and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law. **(Ord. No. 18-594; 07-11-18)**

24-4-17 VEHICLE SOUND AMPLIFICATION SYSTEM. No driver of any motor vehicle shall operate or permit operation of any sound amplification system which can be heard outside the vehicle from **seventy-five (75)** or more feet when the vehicle is being operated upon a highway, unless such system is being operated to request assistance or warn of a hazardous situation.

This Section does not apply to authorized emergency vehicles. Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this Section shall be fined **One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120.00)** for said violation.

Any person receiving a citation under this Section shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Section and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge. Nothing in this Section shall preclude the Village, its police department, or other attorney from taking or pursuing any action allowed by law as a result of the violation or from referring the matter to another entity for prosecution as allowed by law.

24-4-18 <u>PENALTIES FOR SPEEDING VIOLATIONS – PROCEDURES.</u> Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this Article shall be fined **One Hundred Twenty Dollars** (\$120.00) for said violation.

Any person receiving a citation under this Section shall pay the fine provided for in this Section at the police station or Village Clerk's office within **fourteen (14) days** from the date of the citation. If any penalty is not paid within that **fourteen (14) day** period, the police chief or the Village Attorney is authorized to file a complaint alleging the violation of this Section and issue a notice to appear requiring the person to whom the citation was issued to appear in the Crawford County Circuit Court to answer the charge.

ARTICLE V - EQUIPMENT OF VEHICLES

- 24-5-1 <u>ILLINOIS VEHICLE CODE</u>; <u>EQUIPMENT OF VEHICLES ADOPTED</u>. The Illinois Vehicle Code, <u>Illinois Compiled Statutes</u>, <u>Chapter 625</u>, <u>Section 12</u>, entitled "<u>Equipment of Vehicles</u>", as passed, approved, and amended by the Illinois General Assembly is hereby adopted by the Village and the provisions thereof shall be controlling within the corporate limits of the Village. (625 ILCS 5/12-605, 5/12-605.1; and 5/12-605.2)
- 24-5-2 <u>MUFFLER.</u> No motor vehicle shall be operated on any street unless such vehicle is provided with a muffler in efficient actual working condition; and the use of a cut-out is prohibited. No muffler shall cause an unreasonably loud or excessive noise. (625 ILCS 5/12-602)

ARTICLE VI - PARKING RULES

24-6-1 TIME LIMIT PARKING. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle for a period of time in excess of the amount of time designated by law and so posted.

- **24-6-2 PARKING FOR SALE OR REPAIR.** No person shall park a vehicle upon any street for the purpose of:
 - (A) displaying such vehicle for sale; or
- (B) washing, greasing or repairing such vehicle, except when emergency repairs are necessary.

24-6-3 <u>STOPPING, STANDING OR PARKING PROHIBITED IN SPECIFIED</u> PLACES.

(A) Except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic, or in compliance with law or the directions of a police officer or official traffic-control devices, no person shall:

(1) Stop, Stand or Park a Vehicle:

- (a) On the roadway side of any vehicle stopped or parked at the edge or curb of a street.
- (b) On a sidewalk.
- (c) Within an intersection.
- (d) On a crosswalk.
- (e) Between a safety zone and the adjacent curb or within **thirty** (30) feet of points on the curb immediately opposite the ends of a safety zone, unless a different length is indicated by signs or markings.
- (f) Alongside or opposite any street excavation or obstruction when stopping, standing or parking would obstruct traffic.
- (g) Upon any bridge or other elevated structure upon a highway or within a highway tunnel.
- (h) On any railroad tracks.
- (i) At any place where official signs prohibit stopping.
- (j) On any controlled-access highway.
- (k) In the area between roadways of a divided highway, including crossovers.
- (I) In any alley that is open and maintained.
- (2) <u>Stand or Park a Vehicle</u> (whether occupied or not, except momentarily to pick up or discharge passengers) in the following No-Parking zones. See Schedule "E" for designated No-Parking areas. (Ord. No. 06-494; 08-02-06)
 - (a) In front of a public or private driveway.
 - (b) Within **fifteen (15) feet** of a fire hydrant.
 - (c) Within **twenty (20) feet** of a crosswalk at an intersection.
 - (d) Within **thirty (30) feet** upon the approach to any flashing signal, stop sign, yield sign or traffic-control signal located at the side of the roadway.
 - (e) Within **twenty (20) feet** of the driveway entrance to any fire station and on the side of a street opposite the entrance to any fire station within **seventy-five (75) feet** of such entrance (when properly sign-posted).
 - (f) At any place where official signs prohibit standing or parking.

- (3) Parking a Vehicle (whether occupied or not, except temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading property or passengers):
 - (a) within **fifty (50) feet** of the nearest rail of a railroad crossing;

(b) at any place where official signs prohibit parking;

(c) in yellow zones.

- (B) No person shall move a vehicle not lawfully under his control into any such prohibited area or away from a curb such distance as is unlawful.
- (C) Schedules "E", "F" and "G" shall list all applicable no-parking zones. **(625 ILCS 5/11-303)**

24-6-4 PARKING FOR THE HANDICAPPED.

- (A) <u>Designated Parking.</u> Certain parking spaces within the confines of the Village shall be designated for use by handicapped persons' vehicles only and will be posted with appropriate signs to that effect.
- (B) <u>Use of Designated Handicapped Parking.</u> The use of designated handicapped parking locations, duly posted and signed shall to that effect, be open to any vehicle which bears the appropriate handicapped Illinois Registration Plate issued by the Secretary of State for the State of Illinois, or a valid handicapped parking permit issued by another governmental agency or which bears a handicapped card furnished in accordance with Illinois Compiled Statutes, Chapter 625; Section 5/11-1301.1, et. seq. furnished by the Village.
- (C) <u>Application for Illinois Handicapped Registration Plate.</u> The issuance of an Illinois Handicapped Motor Vehicle Registration Plate shall be made with the Secretary of State of the State of Illinois at any facility provided and approved for that purpose by the Secretary of State. (625 ILCS 5/11-1301.2)
- (D) Penalty. Any vehicle parked in violation of this Article in a posted designated handicapped space which does not bear an Illinois Handicapped Registration Plate, or a valid handicapped parking permit issued by another governmental agency of a Village Handicapped Registration Card will be ticketed and the vehicle will be removed in accordance with departmental policies and in accordance with Section 5/11-1302, Chapter 625 of the Illinois Compiled Statutes. The registered owner of the vehicle as ascertained by the registration plates of the vehicle will be presumed to be in control of the vehicle and will be fined One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). The same registered owner will be held liable for the cost of removal of the vehicle and must pay that cost, plus storage charges, if any, prior to the release of the vehicle.
- (E) <u>Handicapped Parking Areas.</u> Those places designated as "Handicapped Parking Spaces" are listed in **Schedule "H".**

24-6-5 LOAD LIMITS.

- (A) <u>Established.</u> There is hereby established "gross load limits" on certain Village streets. The term "gross load limit" shall mean the total weight of a vehicle and the load it is carrying. The specified streets and the load limits are hereby listed in **Schedule "J".**
- (B) **Restrictions.** It shall be unlawful to operate a vehicle upon any street where the operation is prohibited by this Section and where such signs of prohibition are posted, except that a vehicle may be driven on such street for not more than the minimum distance necessary for the purpose of making deliveries or picking up loads.
- (C) <u>Exceptions.</u> This Chapter shall not include pickup trucks, trucks operated by the Village maintenance and repairs on the street or the operation of a vehicle owned by the U.S. government or State of Illinois while on lawful business of these agencies.

24-6-6 TOWING CARS AWAY. The Police Department and all members thereof assigned to traffic duty are hereby authorized to remove and tow away, or have removed and towed away by commercial towing service, any car, boat, trailer, or other vehicle illegally parked in any place where such parked vehicle creates or constitutes a traffic hazard, blocks the use of a fire hydrant or obstructs or may obstruct the movement of any emergency vehicle; or any vehicle which has been parked in any public street or other public place for a period of **twenty-four (24) hours**.

Vehicles towed away shall be stored on any Village property or in a public garage or parking lot and shall be restored to the owner or operator thereof after payment of the expense incurred by the

Village in removing and storing such vehicle(s).

PARKING VIOLATIONS. Any person accused of a violation of an ordinance prohibiting parking a vehicle in a designated area or restricting the length of time a vehicle may be there parked, may settle and compromise the claim against him or her for such illegal parking by paying to the Village Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each such offense. Such payment may be made at the Village Hall and a receipt shall be issued for all money so received and such money shall be promptly turned over to the Treasurer to be credited to the General Fund. The members of the Police Department are hereby authorized to refrain from instituting a prosecution for the alleged offense involved for at least forty-eight (48) hours; provided, however, that this section shall not apply to persons parking a vehicle so as to obstruct the entrance or apparatus or other emergency equipment is kept or housed or so as to block an emergency entrance in a hospital. Nor shall this section apply to any person charged with parking a vehicle so as to entirely obstruct traffic in any street or alley or parking in such a way as to reduce traffic on an arterial street to one-way traffic only; nor to any person who refuses to remove a vehicle illegally parked at the request of any member of the Police Department.

24-6-8 PRIMA FACIE PROOF. The fact that a vehicle which is illegally parked or operated is registered in the name of a person shall be considered prima facie proof that such person was in control of the vehicle at the time of such violation.

24-6-9 PARKING TICKETS - STATE STATUTE. The Village Board intends to utilize Illinois Compiled Statutes, Chapter 625; Section 5/6-306.5 and the procedure set forth therein.

The appropriate authorities are hereby authorized to utilize the statute and the procedure set forth therein.

ARTICLE VII - ABANDONED VEHICLES

24-7-1 DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this Code, the following words shall have the meanings ascribed to them as follows:

<u>"ABANDONED VEHICLE"</u> shall mean all motor vehicles or other vehicles in a state of disrepair, rendering the vehicle incapable of being driven in its condition; or any motor vehicle or other vehicle that has not been moved or used for **seven (7) consecutive days** or more and is apparently deserted.

"ANTIQUE VEHICLE" means any motor vehicle or other vehicle twenty-five (25) years of age or older.

"COMPONENT PART" means any part of a vehicle other than a tire having a manufacturer's identification number or an identification number issued by the Secretary of State.

<u>"DERELICT VEHICLE"</u> means any inoperable, unregistered, or discarded motor vehicle, regardless of title, having lost its characteristic as a substantial property and left unattended without justification on the owner's, lienholder's or other legally entitled person's land contrary to the public policy expressed in this Code.

"HIGHWAY" means any street, alley or public way within this municipality.

"REMOVE" means to remove, deface, cover, or destroy.

<u>"VEHICLE"</u> means every device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a street or highway, whether subject to or exempt from registration, excepting, however, bicycles, snowmobiles and devices used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks. (See 625 ILCS Sec. 5/4-201)

24-7-2 ABANDONMENT.

- (A) <u>Highway.</u> The abandonment of a motor vehicle or other vehicle or part thereof on any highway in this Municipality is unlawful and subject to penalties as set forth herein.
- (B) Private Property. The abandonment of a vehicle or any part thereof on private or public property other than a highway in view of the general public anywhere in this Municipality is unlawful, except on property of the owner, or bailee of such abandoned vehicle, and except as provided in paragraph (C).
- (C) <u>Owner's Property.</u> A vehicle or any part thereof so abandoned on private property, of the owner or bailee of such abandoned vehicle, for a period not exceeding **seven (7) days**, unless such vehicle is kept within a building or out of public view, shall be authorized for removal.
- 24-7-3 POSSESSION OF VEHICLE BY OTHER PARTY; TOWING. Where an abandoned, lost, stolen or unclaimed motor vehicle or other vehicle comes into the temporary possession or custody of a person in this municipality who is not the owner, lienholder or other legally entitled person of the vehicle, such person shall immediately notify the Police Department when the vehicle is within the corporate limits of the municipality. Upon receipt of such notification, the Police Department or designated representative shall authorize a towing service to remove and take possession of the abandoned, lost, stolen or unclaimed motor vehicle or other vehicle. The towing service will safely keep the towed vehicle and its contents, maintain a record of the tow, as set forth in Section 24-7-5, until the vehicle is claimed by the owner, lienholder, or any other person legally entitled to possession thereof or until it is disposed of as provided in this Chapter. (625 ILCS 5/4-202)

24-7-4 REMOVAL OF MOTOR VEHICLES OR OTHER VEHICLES - TOWING OR HAULING AWAY.

- (A) When a vehicle is abandoned or left unattended on a highway in an urban district for **ten (10) hours** or more, its removal by a towing service may be authorized by the Police Department.
- (B) When an abandoned, unattended, wrecked, burned or partially dismantled vehicle is creating a traffic hazard because of its position in relation to the highway or its physical appearance is causing the impeding of traffic, its immediate removal from the highway or private property adjacent to the highway by a towing service may be authorized by the Police Department.
- (C) When a vehicle removal from either public or private property is authorized by the Police Department, the owner, lienholder or other legally entitled person of the vehicle shall be responsible for all towing costs.
- (D) The remaining provisions of Section 4-203 of Chapter 95 1/2, of the Illinois Compiled Statutes are hereby adopted by reference and the provisions thereof shall be controlling within the corporate limits of this municipality. (625 ILCS 5/4-203)
- 24-7-5 POLICE RESPONSIBILITIES. When a vehicle is authorized to be towed away as provided herein, the Police Department shall keep and maintain a record of the vehicle towed, listing by color, year of manufacture, manufacturer's trade name, manufacturer's series name, body style, vehicle identification number and license plate year and number displayed on the vehicle. The record shall also include the date and hour of tow, location towed from, location towed to, reason for towing and the name of the officer authorizing the tow. (625 ILCS 5/4-204)
- **24-7-6 UNKNOWN OWNER.** When the Police Department does not know the identity of the registered owner, lienholder or other legally entitled person, they will cause the motor vehicle registration records of the State of Illinois to be searched by a directed communication to the Secretary of State for the purpose of obtaining the required ownership information.

The Police Department authorizing the impoundment shall cause the stolen motor vehicle files of the Illinois State Police to be searched by a directed communication to the Illinois State Police for stolen or wanted information of the vehicle. The information determined from these record searches shall be used by the Police Department in sending notification by certified mail to the owner, lienholder or legally entitled person advising where the vehicle is held, requesting a disposition to be made and setting forth public sale information. (625 ILCS 5/4-205)

- **24-7-7 IDENTIFYING AND TRACING VEHICLE.** When the registered owner, lienholder, or other person legally entitled to the possession of a motor vehicle or other vehicle cannot be identified from the registration files of this State or from the registration files of a foreign state, if applicable, the Police Department shall notify the Illinois State Police for the purpose of identifying the vehicle's owner, lienholder, or other person legally entitled to the possession of the vehicle. The information obtained by the Illinois State Police shall be immediately forwarded to the Police Department having custody of the vehicle for notification purposes as set forth in **Section 24-7-6** of this Chapter. **(625 ILCS 5/4-206)**
- 24-7-8 <u>RECLAIMED VEHICLES EXPENSES.</u> Any time before a motor vehicle or other vehicle is sold at public sale or disposed of as provided in **Section 24-7-9**, the owner, lienholder, or other person legally entitled to its possession may reclaim the vehicle by presenting to the Police Department proof of ownership or proof of the right to possession of the vehicle. No vehicle shall be released to the owner, lienholder, or other legally entitled person under this section until all towing and storage charges have been paid. **(625 ILCS 5/4-207)**

24-7-9 DISPOSAL OF UNCLAIMED VEHICLE. Whenever an abandoned, lost, stolen, or unclaimed motor vehicle or other vehicle **seven (7) years** of age or newer remains unclaimed by the registered owner, lienholder, or other person legally entitled to its possession for a period of **thirty (30) days** after notice has been given as provided herein, the Police Department having possession of the vehicle shall cause it to be sold at public auction to a person licensed as an automatic parts recycler, rebuilder or scrap processor under **Chapter 5** of **Chapter 95 1/2**, **of the Illinois Compiled Statutes**. Notice of the time and place of the sale shall be posted in a conspicuous place for at least **ten (10) days** prior to the sale on the premises where the vehicle has been impounded. At least **ten (10) days** prior to the sale, the Police Department shall cause a notice of the time and place to be sent by certified mail to the registered owner, lienholder, or other person known by the Police Department or towing service to be legally entitled to the possession of the vehicle. Such notice shall contain a complete description of the vehicle to be sold and what steps must be taken by any legally entitled person to reclaim the vehicle.

In those instances where the certified notification specified herein has been returned by he postal authorities to the Police Department due to the addressee having moved or being unknown at the address obtained from the registration records of this State, the sending of a second certified notice shall not be required.

24-7-10 DISPOSAL OF UNCLAIMED VEHICLES WITHOUT NOTICE.

- (A) New Car. When the identity of the registered owner, lienholder, or other person legally entitled to the possession of an abandoned, lost, or unclaimed vehicle of **seven (7) years** of age or newer cannot be determined by any means provided for in this Chapter, the vehicle may be sold as provided for in **Section 24-7-9** of this Code without notice to any person whose identity cannot be determined.
- (B) Old Car. When an abandoned vehicle of more than seven (7) years of age is impounded as specified by this Code, it shall be kept in custody for a minimum of ten (10) days for the purpose of determining the identity of the registered owner and lienholder and contacting the registered owner and lienholder by the U.S. Mail, public service or in person for a determination of disposition; and an examination of the Illinois State Police stolen motor vehicle files for theft and wanted information. (At the expiration of the ten (10) day period without the benefit of disposition information being received from the registered owner, lienholder or other legally entitled person, the Chief of Police shall authorize the disposal of the vehicle as junk.)
- (C) <u>Antique Vehicle.</u> A vehicle classified as an antique vehicle may, however, be sold to a person desiring to restore it. (625 ILCS 5/4-209)
- **24-7-11 POLICE RECORD FOR DISPOSED VEHICLE.** When a motor vehicle or other vehicle in the custody of the Police Department is reclaimed by the registered owner, lienholder, or other legally entitled person or when the vehicle is sold at public sale or otherwise disposed of as provided in this Chapter, a report of the transaction shall be maintained by the Police Department for a period of one (1) year from the date of the sale or disposal. **(625 ILCS 5/4-210)**
- **24-7-12 PUBLIC SALE PROCEEDS.** When a vehicle located within the corporate limits of this municipality is authorized to be towed away by the Police Department and disposed of as set forth in this Code, the proceeds of the public sale or disposition, after the deduction of towing, storage and processing charges, shall be deposited in the municipal treasury. **(625 ILCS 5/4-211)**
- 24-7-13 <u>LIABILITY.</u> A law enforcement officer or agency, towing service owner, operator or employee shall not be held to answer or be liable for damages in any action brought by the registered owner, former registered owner or his legal representative, lienholder, or any other person legally entitled to the possession of a vehicle when the vehicle was processed and sold or disposed of as provided by this Code. (625 ILCS 5/4-213)

24-7-14 **PENALTY.**

(A) Any person who violates or aids and abets in the violation of this Article is guilty of a petty offense, and

shall be fined not less than Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75.00) nor more than

Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00), and

(C) shall be required by the Court to make a disposition on the abandoned or unclaimed vehicle and pay all towing and storage charges pursuant to this Article. (625 ILCS 5/4-214)

ARTICLE VIII - OBSTRUCTION OF CROSSINGS

24-8-1 OBSTRUCTION OF CROSSINGS.

(A) Except as provided in paragraph (B) of this Section, it shall be unlawful for a rail carrier to permit any train, railroad car or engine to obstruct public travel at a railroad-highway grade crossing for a period in excess of **ten (10) minutes**.

The following shall be affirmative defenses to a charge brought under paragraph

(A) of this Section:

(B)

- (1) The obstruction was caused by compliance with a statute or regulation of the United States government or statute or regulation of the State of Illinois.
- (2) The obstruction was caused by circumstances over which the rail carrier had no reasonable control.
- (3) The train, railroad car or engine was continuously moving during the period of the obstruction.
- (C) Any person who violates or aids and abets in the violation of this Article is guilty of a petty offense, and shall be fined no less than **Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75.00)** nor more than **Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00)**, costs and the reasonable attorney's fees of the Village.

ARTICLE IX - GOLF CARTS AND NEIGHBORHOOD VEHICLES

24-9-1 **DEFINITIONS.**

<u>"GOLF CART":</u> (625 ILCS 5/1-123.9) A vehicle specifically designed and intended for the purpose of transporting one or more persons and their golf clubs or maintenance equipment while engaged in the playing of golf, supervising the play of golf, or maintaining the condition of the grounds on a public or private golf course.

<u>"NEIGHBORHOOD VEHICLE":</u> (625 ILCS 5/1-148.1) A self-propelled, electric powered, four-wheeled motor vehicle (or a self-propelled, gasoline powered, four-wheeled motor vehicle with an engine displacement under one thousand two hundred (1,200) cubic centimeters) that is capable of attaining in one (1) mile a speed of more than twenty (20) miles per hour, but not more than twenty-five (25) miles per hour, and which conforms to federal regulations under Title 49 C.F.R. Part 571.500.

"UTV (Utility Vehicle)": A side-by-side, small 2-6 person four-wheel drive off-road vehicle.

24-9-2	REQUIREMENTS.	All persons	operating	a golf	cart,	neighborhood	vehicle	0
UTV on the designated	streets of the Village	must comply	with the fo	ollowing	g requ	irements:		

- (A) Proof of Liability Insurance on said vehicle.
- (B) Must display Village of Oblong decal on front and rear of vehicle.
- (C) Must be inspected by the Chief of Police.
- (D) Must have a valid driver's license.
- (E) Must be equipped with seatbelts, a full windshield, horn, brakes, turn signals, a steering wheel, a rearview mirror, red reflective warning devices in the front and rear, a slow moving vehicle emblem (as required of other vehicles in 625 ILCS 5/12-709) on the rear of the vehicle, a headlight that emits a white light that is visible from a distance of five hundred (500) feet in front of vehicle, a tail lamp that emits a red light that is visible from a distance of one hundred (100) feet from the rear of vehicle, and brake lights. When operated on a roadway, a golf cart or neighborhood vehicle shall have its headlights and taillights lighted.
 - (F) Must obey all traffic laws of the State of Illinois and the Village.
 - (G) Must be at least **eighteen (18) years** of age.
 - (H) Can be driven on any street within the Village, except for Main Street.
- (I) No modifications allowed to the suspension of the golf cart or neighborhood vehicle.
- (J) Must not exceed **twenty (20) miles per hour** even though some vehicles are able to go beyond this.
- (K) Crossing of State highway when authorized by State of Illinois Department of Transportation.
 - (L) May only be operated between the hours of **6:00 a.m.** to **10:00 P.M.**
- (M) Golf carts and neighborhood vehicles shall not be operated in inclement weather, nor when visibility is impaired by weather, smoke, fog or other conditions; or at any time when there is insufficient light to clearly see persons and vehicles on the roadway at a distance of **five hundred (500) feet**. The Police shall determine when conditions are not appropriate for the safe operation of golf carts or neighborhood vehicles.
- (N) A person who drives or is in actual physical control of a golf cart or neighborhood vehicle on a roadway while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs is subject to Section 11-500 through 11-502 of the **Illinois Compiled Statutes (625 ILCS 5/11-500 through 11-502)**.
- (O) Golf carts or neighborhood vehicles may not be operated on sidewalks or other public property not accessible to or authorized to vehicular traffic.

- (P) Golf carts or neighborhood vehicles may not be operated on streets or highways and roads under the jurisdiction of the Illinois Department of Transportation (Illinois Route 33, Main Street) or the County Highway Department.
- (Q) Golf carts or neighborhood vehicles may not be operated on State or County roads except to cross at designated streets when authorized by the State of Illinois Department of Transportation or the County Highway Department as applicable.
- (R) All drivers of a golf cart or neighborhood vehicle shall comply and be responsible for following and obeying the **Illinois Compiled Statutes 625 ILCS 5/12-603.1** in regards to the Illinois Child Protection Act with the proper use of seat belts and/or child safety seats.
- (S) Sand rails and dune buggies do not qualify as a UTV and cannot operate on Village streets. (Ord. No. 2024-653; 11-06-24)

24-9-3 **PERMITS.**

- (A) No person shall operate a golf cart or neighborhood vehicle without obtaining a permit from the Village Clerk, as provided herein. Permits shall be granted for a period of **one (1) year** and may be renewed annually. The cost of a permit is **Fifty Dollars (\$50.00)**, except if the individual is a veteran or active serviceman then the cost is **Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00)**. Insurance coverage is to be verified to be in effect by the Village Clerk when obtaining and renewing a permit.
- (B) Every application for a permit shall be made on a form supplied by the Village Clerk and shall contain the following information:
 - (1) Name, address and phone number of applicant.
 - (2) Name and phone number of Liability Insurance carrier.
 - (3) The serial number, make, model and description with photo of the golf cart or neighborhood vehicle.
 - (4) Signed waiver of liability by applicant releasing the Village from any and all future claims resulting from the operation of their golf cart or neighborhood vehicle pursuant to the Ordinance or any other Ordinance of the Village.
 - (5) Photo copy of applicable liability insurance coverage card specifically for the golf cart or neighborhood vehicle to be operated on Village streets.
 - (6) Such other information as the Village may require.
 - (C) No permit shall be granted unless the following conditions are met:
 - (1) The golf cart or neighborhood vehicle must be inspected by the Police Chief to insure that the vehicle is safe to operate on Village streets and is in compliance with the requirements of the Ordinance.
 - (2) Any handicapped applicant must submit a certificate signed by a physician that he/she is handicapped and is able to safely operate a motorized golf cart or neighborhood vehicle.
 - (3) The applicant must provide evidence of insurance in compliance with the provisions of Illinois Statutes regarding minimum liability insurance for passenger motor vehicles to be operated on the roads in the State of Illinois.
- (D) A golf cart or neighborhood vehicle will be allowed to be driven to the Police Department to have the vehicle inspected and permitted.
- (E) Exceptions may apply for not requiring a permit such as special events (Ex. Oblong Antique Tractor and Engine Show, Crawford County Fair, etc.) when the Chief of Police is notified beforehand.
- (F) Sand rails and dune buggies are not eligible for an operating permit pursuant to this Section. (Ord. No. 2024-653; 11-06-24)

The Village Board of Trustees may suspend or revoke a permit granted hereunder upon a finding that the holder thereof has violated any of the provisions of this Article or if there is evidence that the permittee cannot safely operate the golf cart or neighborhood vehicle. Also, the Village Board of Trustees may revoke the permit if permittee violates any traffic laws as defined in the Vehicle Code of the **Illinois Compiled Statutes**.

24-20

Every person operating a golf cart or neighborhood vehicle pursuant to permit hereunder on designated Village streets has all the rights and duties applicable to a driver of any other vehicle pursuant to the State of Illinois highway traffic laws and regulations except when those provisions cannot reasonably be applied to golf cart or neighborhood vehicle.

Any person who violates any provision of this Article shall upon conviction be subject to a fine not less than **Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75.00)**, nor more than **Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00)**, and the costs of prosecution. Also, any person who violates the provisions of this Article, if he/she is a permit holder, will be subject to revocation of the permit.

Permits will be valid for a period of **one (1) year** being **May 1** through **April 30**. The dates of a valid permit are based on the Village fiscal year.

license suspended/revol	ced driving under the influence):

- (F) Arrested on an outstanding warrant for failure to appear in court on charges of driving while license suspended/revoked or driving under the influence.
- **24-10-2 PENALTIES.** The owner of any motor vehicle seized and impounded under this Section shall be liable to the Village for any administrative penalty not to exceed **Five Hundred Dollars** (**\$500.00**), plus any towing and storage fees hereinafter provided.
- **24-10-3 EXCEPTIONS.** This Section shall not apply if the motor vehicle used in connection with the violation was stolen at the time and the theft was reported to the appropriate police authorities within **seventy-two (72) hours** after the theft was discovered.

24-10-4 IMPOUNDMENT HEARING.

- (A) Whenever a police officer has probable cause to believe that a motor vehicle is subject to seizure and impoundment pursuant to **Section 24-10-1** the police officer shall provide for the towing of a vehicle to a facility controlled or designated by the Village or its agents. Before or at the time the vehicle is towed, the police officer shall notify any person identifying himself as the owner of the vehicle or any person who is found to be in control of the vehicle at the time of the alleged violation, of the fact of the seizure and of the vehicle owner's right to request a vehicle impoundment hearing to be conducted under this Section.
- (B) If the owner of record of a vehicle seized pursuant to **Section 24-10-1** desires to appeal the seizure, said owner must make a request for said hearing within **seventy-two (72) hours** of the seizure. Said request shall be in writing and filed with the Chief of Police or his designee. If an appeal is timely filed a hearing officer of the Village shall conduct such hearing within **seventy-two (72) hours** after the request, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. All interested persons shall be given a reasonable opportunity to be heard at the hearing. The formal rules of evidence will not apply at the hearing and hearsay evidence shall be admissible. The hearing officer will determine whether there is probable cause to believe the vehicle is subject to seizure and impoundment pursuant to **Section 24-10-1**. In those cases where probable cause exists, the hearing officer shall order the continued impoundment of the vehicle, unless the owner of the vehicle posts a cash bond in the amount of **Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00)**, plus any applicable towing and storage fees. In those cases where probable cause does not exist, the hearing officer shall order the immediate release of the vehicle.
- (C) Unless a hearing is held pursuant to (B) above, within **ten (10) days** after a motor vehicle is seized and impounded pursuant to **Section 24-10-1**, the Village shall notify by certified mail, return receipt requested, the owner of record of the date and location of hearing to be conducted. The hearing shall be scheduled and held, unless continued by order of the hearing officer, no later than

forty-five (45) days after the vehicle was seized. All interested persons shall be given a reasonable opportunity to be heard at the hearing. The formal rules of evidence will not apply at the hearing and hearsay evidence shall be admissible. The hearing officer will determine whether there is probable cause to believe the vehicle is subject to seizure and impoundment pursuant to **Section 24-10-1**. If the hearing officer determines by a preponderance of evidence that the vehicle was used in connection with a violation and that no exception applies, the hearing officer shall enter an order finding the owner of record of the vehicle civilly liable to the Village and an administrative penalty in an amount not to exceed **Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00)**. If the owner of the record fails to appeal at the hearing, the hearing officer shall enter a default order in favor of the Village requiring the payment to the Village of an administrative penalty in an amount not to exceed **Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00)**. If the hearing officer finds the vehicle was not used in connection with a violation or that an exception applies, the hearing officer shall order the immediate return of the vehicle or posted cash bond.

(D) If an administrative penalty is imposed pursuant to this Section, such penalty shall constitute a debt due and owing to the Village. If a cash bond has been posted pursuant to this Section, the bond shall be applied to the penalty. If a vehicle has been impounded when such a penalty is imposed, the Village may seek to obtain a judgment on the debt and enforce such judgment against the vehicle as provided by law. Except as provided otherwise in this Section, a vehicle shall continue to be impounded until:

(1) the penalty, plus any applicable towing and storage fees, is paid to the Village, in which case possession of the vehicle shall be given to the person who is legally entitled to possess the vehicle; or

(2) the vehicle is sold or otherwise disposed of to satisfy a judgment to enforce a lien as provided by law.

If the administrative penalty and applicable fees are not paid within thirty (30) days after an administrative penalty is imposed under this Section against an owner of record who is in default for failing to appear at the hearing, the vehicle shall be deemed unclaimed and shall be disposed of in the manner provided by law for the disposition of unclaimed vehicles. In all other cases, if the administrative penalty and applicable fees are not paid within thirty (30) days after the expiration of time at which administrative review of the hearing officer's determination may be sought or within thirty (30) days after an action seeking administrative review has been resolved in favor of the Village, whichever is applicable, the vehicle shall be deemed unclaimed and shall be disposed of in the matter provided by law for the disposition of unclaimed vehicles under Section 4-208 of the Illinois Vehicle Code (625 ILCS 5/14-208). Except as otherwise specifically provided by law, no owner, lien holder or other person shall be legally entitled to take possession of a vehicle impounded under this Section until the civil penalty and fees applicable under this Section have been paid. However, whenever a person with a lien of record against an impounded vehicle has commenced foreclosure proceedings, possession of the vehicle shall be given to that person if he or she agrees in writing to refund the Village the amount of the net proceeds of any foreclosure sale, less any amount required to pay all lien holders of record, not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), plus any applicable fees.

(E) For purposes of this Section, the "owner of record" of a vehicle is the record title holder as registered with the Illinois Secretary of State.

24-10-5 HEARING OFFICER. The Chairperson of the Village's Police Committee shall serve as the hearing officer for purposes of these sections. Whenever any reference to a hearing officer is used, herein, those hearing officers are appointed for purposes for the adjudication system and pursuant to said applicable ordinance, shall be and are hereby deemed to be authorized to act as hearing officers, pursuant to these sections.

24-10-6 <u>IMPOUNDMENT FEE AND PENALTY.</u>

(A) <u>Impoundment Fee.</u> In addition to the penalties provided for in Section 24-10-6(B) there shall be an initial Impoundment Fee of Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75.00) plus Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) per day thereafter while impounded, up to a maximum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00). If vehicle is impounded after 4:00 P.M. on Friday or on the weekend the vehicle owner will not be charged the **Thirty Dollars** (\$30.00) per day for the first weekend if payment is made by **10:00 A.M.** the following Monday. Said Impoundment Fee shall be paid to the Village by the owner of record of the impounded vehicle.

(B) Penalty. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision in this title, for which another penalty is not provided, shall for a first conviction be fined not less than Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75.00) nor more than Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00), for a second conviction within one (1) year thereafter, the person, firm or corporation shall be fined not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) nor more than Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) and for a third conviction or subsequent conviction within one (1) year after the first conviction, the person, firm or corporation shall be fined not less than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) nor more than Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00). A separate offense shall be deemed committed on each day during or which a violation occurs or continues.
